

GAURAV ROY CHOUDHURY

PRINCIPAL ARCHITECT - GAURAV ROY CHOUDHURY ARCHITECTS (GRCA)



Good design, for me, is holistic and sensitive. It is about how far the designer is willing to look and test the girth of the craft"



e looks up to film makers, artists, musicians and writers who create what they believe in. "There are masterpieces scattered all over the world which no one knows about. But today, everything is about fame and money. Sometimes, it feels like the whole world wants you to abandon your beliefs - because it's so much easier and so much more financially viable. I respect everyone who has the strength of character to do what they believe in," declares architect Gaurav Roy Choudhury of GRCA.

After his graduation in 2002 and post-graduate fellowship in 2004 from KRVIA, Mumbai, Choudhury joined Mathew & Ghosh Architects in Bengaluru. Since he started getting small projects in the city, he set up a small practice. Gradually, more and bigger projects came his way – and the Mumbai boy decided to consolidate his practice in Bengaluru in 2007. Today, the firm's portfolio includes a number of projects in architecture, interior design, graphic design, urban design and housing. A self-proclaimed dreamer, Choudhury's imagination always had a spatial sense. With an artist mother and an engineer father, he had a flair for both – thus paving his way to architecture.

GRCA is a small-sized firm because "it keeps the logistics simple and creativity in focus." Their philosophy is to increase the sensitivity and aptitude of the practice by pushing themselves to "feel" more during the design process. For them, getting a feel of the space will indirectly push the ideas of functionality and sustainability in the form and space equations of architecture.

The 35-year-old architect always liked spaces which didn't try too hard to 'look pretty', but just



seem to have manifested from a process of listening and observing. "I like the Centre Georges Pompidou in Paris by Renzo Piano and Richard Rogers, for what it started; and I am a fan of the earlier works of Charles Correa, for their honest aesthetic," he discloses.

The young architect also has some very sharp insights about technology; observing rather woefully how we are losing skills and crafts to technological innovations that never seem to be made for the average-income person. He perceives the construction industry to be getting out of the hands of normal folk.

Choudhury believes the challenge is to push design and, with it, society, to a more responsible place. "We need to become responsible citizens and participate. Sensibilities need to evolve quicker – so that our world is no longer a place shaped by our insecurities, but by our honesty and vibrancy," he recommends.

Though it follows his belief of sensitive architecture, Choudhury feels that the studio has not yet produced a path-breaking project. However, he lists the Ghose House as his favourite. It was his first and significant project, which led him to set up GRCA in Bengaluru; and he believes that the project has a visceral relevance to his design thinking in all the work that followed.
